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AMERICAN JOURNAL OF POLICE SCIENCE INDEX*

Since the incorporation, in 1932, of the *American Journal of Police Science* into the *Journal of Criminal Law and Criminology* there has arisen a growing need for a comprehensive index of the police science material which has accumulated in both of these publications. With a view of accommodating police science readers in this particular the following index, or perhaps more properly designated guide, has been prepared and published.

The various police science contributions which have appeared in the three volumes of the *American Journal of Police Science* and in the five volumes of the *Journal of Criminal Law and Criminology* since the combination of these two journals, have been grouped under the following titles, and in the order named: (1) Personal Identification; (2) Document Examination; (3) Firearms and Firearms Identification; (4) Microanalysis; (5) Comparative Micrography; (6) Detection of Deception; (7) Chemistry and Toxicology; (8) Legal Medicine and Medical Jurisprudence; (9) Blood Tests; (10) Tracks, Impressions, and Their Preservation; (11) Photography, Plans and Sketches; (12) Light and Radiation; (13) Expert Witness; (14) Laboratories and Institutes; (15) Instruction and Training for Criminal Investigators and Police Officers; (16) Police; (17) Miscellaneous; (18) Book Reviews. This arrangement was thought to be of greater value to police science readers than the conventional type of index. Subclassifications have been omitted, except in two instances. The relatively few contributions appearing under each of so large a number of possible subtopics did not seem to justify a further classification.

The citations should be interpreted as follows: the first number represents the volume (1, 2, and 3 of the *American Journal of Police Science* at the time of its individual identity as such; 23, 24, 25, 26, and 27 of the *Journal of Criminal Law and Criminology*, containing the *American Journal of Police Science* since the combination of both publications), the second number the particular issue of either journal, and the third number or numbers the page reference. The asterisk (*) signifies that the article is illustrated.
