CHANGE IN JOURNAL EDITORSHIP

From July, 1941 until May of 1944, the American Journal of Police Science was edited by Mr. Ordway Hilton, who was then Examiner of Questioned Documents at the Chicago Police Scientific Crime Detection Laboratory. When Mr. Hilton's duties as an intelligence officer in the United States Naval Reserve called for his departure from Chicago to other parts of the country and abroad, it became necessary for him to resign his editorship. We then requested Dr. David G. Monroe of the Northwestern Traffic Institute to assume the responsibility of the American Journal of Police Science. Although operating under a very busy schedule at the Traffic School, Dr. Monroe agreed to assume this added responsibility.

Since May, 1944, Dr. Monroe has given generously of his time and efforts not only in the editorship of the American Journal of Police Science but also in promoting its interests generally. Recently, however, upon Dr. Monroe's appointment as Legal Counsel to the Northwestern University Traffic Institute, it became necessary for him to resign as editor because of the pressure of his Institute duties.

The Faculty of Northwestern University School of Law and the Editorial Board of the Journal of Criminal Law and Criminology are deeply appreciative of the fine service rendered by Dr. Monroe in his Editorship of the American Journal of Police Science.

In seeking a replacement for Dr. Monroe, our thoughts naturally turned toward the former editor, Mr. Hilton. He has only recently been released from active duty with the United States Navy, as a Lieutenant Commander, and has established an office as Examiner of Questioned Documents in New York City as an associate of Mr. Elbridge W. Stein. We prevailed upon Mr. Hilton to resume his editorship which he agreed to

do even though he is bearing a full burden of responsibility in his work as document examiner.
