a basic program of sex training in order to be on their guard against improper sexual advances. All cases of sex molestation should be reported to the police; all editors should voluntarily cooperate in keeping the names of sex victims out of the newspapers.

Moreover, our legal structure must be overhauled to keep criminals, particularly sex offenders, from roaming at large after the expiration of their jail sentences. There must be a more realistic understanding of the psychiatric factors which are the very core of the current crime problem. The hoodlum, expressing his distorted self in sex, robbery, clubbings, and murder, is mentally sick. A fine or a short prison sentence will not cure him. At the first evidence of an anti-social tendency, the offender should be committed to a state hospital for psychiatric therapy and treatment, and therein isolated from society for as long as his mental abnormality continues. The community must not wait for a murder before striking back at the neurotic criminal.

Through his deep penetration into the hoodlum trend, the causes and cures of this peculiar vogue of violence, and his analysis of the sex criminal, Howard Whitman has given us an absorbing and significant piece of social commentary.
