4. Some ("but not much") more money for classification staffs.

5. Similarly for part time psychiatric advice to parole and classification boards.

6. Provision for increasing the pay of guards.

7. Civil service for guards and for parole and probation officers.

8. Some ("but not much") more money for improved educational and vocational programs in prison.

9. Requiring all tax-supported institutions to buy supplies from prison industries.

10. Separate department of state government to administer prisons.

11. Revise the criminal code.

12. Abolish the death penalty.

13. Board of impartial medical experts to advise regarding defendant's sanity.

14. Design new rule of insanity.

In addition the author recommends for *administrative* action:

1. Let half of inmates out of prison (to farms, camps, on parole, etc.).

2. Integrate parole with community agencies.

3. Develop pre-release preparation.

4. Educate officers and public on subject of parole.

5. Relax army rule that excludes ex-convicts from service.

6. Keep politics out of prisons, probation, etc.

7. Establish classification by institutions.

8. Provide part-time psychiatric service.

9. High hiring standards and training for guards.

10. Indict brutal guards and wardens.

11. Improve educational and vocational programs.

12. Ironclad security measures in maximum security prisons.

13. Furloughs or conjugal visits (or both) for inmates.
